The principal or head teacher whose time is divided between elementary and secondary schools shall first prorate his total salary to the elementary and secondary schools according to the portion of a six-hour day he devotes to scheduled classroom teaching in those schools and then assign one-half of the remainder of his salary (if any) to the elementary school and the other half to the secondary school.

<sup>&</sup>lt;sup>2</sup>One-fourth of the agriculture teacher's salary is to be assigned to summer work (column 4, above). The remaining three-fourths is to be prorated to elementary and secondary schools according to the portion of a six-hour day he devotes to scheduled classroom teaching in these schools. The remainder of his salary (if any) is to be assigned to part-time and evening schools.

The salary of the librarian whose time is divided between elementary and secondary schools shall be prorated as is the salary of the principal or head teacher described in note 1.
