The Lincoln d select redit is as well e thank t to be th you,</p>	<p align="center"><b>County Nurse Work.</b></p> <p>The County nurse, Mrs. Culley has been engaged in public health work in Loudoun County for four months. During that time she visited seventy schools, has inspected 1500 children, of whom 756 were found defective, 41 with enlarged tonsils, 416 with adenoids, 71 defective ears and 363 with defective eyes.</p> <p>She has visited the homes of 120 of these defective children.</p> <p>Arrangements have been made in various parts of the county for the necessary corrective work to be done at the convenience and least expense of the child.</p> <p>The physicians and surgeons are co operating with the nurse giving their assurance that no child need suffer for medical or surgical cure on account of lack of means.</p> <p>Mrs. McCulley has given 50 health talks to the school children, addresses to Teachers Institutes to the Patron's meetings and 6 to other gatherings.</p> <p>She embraces every opportunity for this educational part the work, instructing the people on matters pertaining to health. She has visited the homes of 120 defective children, helping the mothers with their problems.</p> <p>She endeavors to teach preventive measures which will lessen the number of defects in the children.</p> <p>She has inspected the sanitary conditions of school buildings and grounds. She is endeavoring to correct the poor heating and ventilation of many of them which are causing more throat and lung diseases, also to correct the poor lighting which is injuring the eyes of the pupils and also the improper seating which prevents the proper development of their bodies.</p> <p>A System of Physical Culture has been introduced in the schools, as part of the Daily Program.</p> <p>What is more important than to teach a child to walk, breathe and stand correctly. Slooped shoulders, incorrect breathing and lack of muscular exercise are responsible for many cases of tuberculosis in later life. Educators, who have had wide experience think that these Physical Exercises are indispensable and the schools of Loudoun have made a forward step in the right direction by introducing them.</p> <p>Mrs. McCulley is winning her way among the people who are beginning to understand more about the nature of her work.</p> <p>In every community visited, the people are enthusiastic in the acceptance of her and her work.</p>	<p>Byan this county of Monday, February 7th that an illness of several weeks from Scarlet fever and brain trouble.
