quest to apply to the State Literary Loan fund for an amount not exceeding \$315,000 for improvements to Negro schools.

The school board already has

borrowed \$260,000 for the Douglass elementary school now

under construction.

Chairman James W. Ashton asked the supervisors to consider the consolidation of all Negro Hementary schools into three. Banneker Carver, grade schools,

and Douglass.

Ashton pointed out that Loudoun is now paying between \$30,000 and \$40,000 in tuition fees yearly to Fairfax county for the 121 colored children at Oak Grove. These would be brought back to Loudoun under the consolidated plan and the tuition solidated plan and fees would be saved. Proposed improves the tuition

Proposed improvements, based on a recent school survey, include four additional rooms at Douglass elementary at a cost of not more than \$65,000, two additional rooms at Reproduct for the state of the tional rooms at Banneker for not more than \$50,000 and \$200,000 or an auditorium, cafeteria and

or an auditorium, careteria and modern shop at Douglass High. As Douglass elementary is now planned, there are eight class rooms. Four more are to

be added.
