During May Mr. Frederick Ward, Jr. of the National Probation and Parole Association carried on the field work which will become the basis for a survey to determine the need for a Juvenile Detention Home in the Northern Virginia Region.

This is the first time in Virginia's history that a joint project of this kind has been undertaken and one of the first in the country where local jurisdictions have approached this problem cooperatively. Mr. Ward was assisted greatly in his field work by Mr. Herbert Krueger, Chief, Bureau of Juvenile Probation and Detention of the State Department of Welfare and Institutions.

The survey included the Counties of Arlington, Fairfax and Loudoun and the Cities of Alexandria and Falls Church and was undertaken at the request of the Northern Wirginia Regional Planning Commission whose member jurisdictions had agreed to participate financially in this study.

The Northern Virginia Regional Planning Commission's Committee on Detention Home, co-chairmaned by Mrs. Charles Pickett of Fairfax and Mrs. Kathryn Stone of Arlington appointed an Advisory Committee composed of interested citizens from the verious jurisdictions to assist Mr. Tard on the local level in making the people in their own communities aware of the problem which exists in the detention of juvenile delinquents.

Mr. Ward concluded his field work on May 22 and will now analyze the data gathered and prepare his report and recommendations. A preliminary report will be prepared in collaboration with the various members of the Probation and Parole Association staff and will be submitted about September 15 to the Northern Virginia Commission and its Advisory Committee for digest and comment.

The survey report in final form will be available on or about October 1.
