

- Q. What is the argument in favor of building at Love's corner instead of at Lincoln?
- A. The argument is that it would be shorter for all pupils.
- E. It is <sup>worth</sup> a great deal to have the high school and the grade school together. Our methods of teaching the first grade and the seventh grade children is just as different and they are in the same building. There is decided argument in favor of combining the two. If the building is in Purcellville with a bus being run from Lincoln, I do not see any advantage in having the pupils separated. A child on his way from Hamilton would not be saved much by coming to the Love's corner to Purcellville, or to Lincoln.
- I think the agricultural part of the thing would be the objection. They would object to its being in town. I do not think it would be acceptable in the town. They want the outside setting.
- S. I am opposed to having a high school and a grade school together. The playing of the high school and grade school children together is a greater proposition. There is a wonderful difference at Lincoln since we separated them.
- E. I do not think this would be so difficult. There is one boy in the Purcellville school who took charge of the play grounds and they were helpless to deal with the situation. The teachers managed to work it out.
- S. If you had teachers enough to direct the whole play it would be a wonderful thing, but I have not been able to get the teachers to do it.
- E. If the building is put at Lincoln, it will take more than one bus to haul the children from Purcellville to Lincoln.
