Every year we reach higher honors and more recognition than the previous year. We all feel that this year's exhibits and quality of exhibits will out number those of the past years.

For encouragement to exhibitors we award ribbons and prizes of \$1, first; 50c, second; 25c, third. The classes that any Home Ec. girl may enter are as follows:

Best plate of biscuits, best plate of home made candies, best cake, best pie, best plate of gingerbread, best yeast bread or rolls, best novelty gift, best miscellaneous article, best apron, best cotton garment, best wool garment, best knitted article, best embroidery or hemstitched work.

We are very grateful to all of our contributors who make it possible for us to give the prizes. A fee of 10c is charged for each exhibit which goes to help pay for the prize ribbons, miscellaneous articles and food to be served for the visitors.

Lunch will be on sale. We are serving ham sandwiches, lettuce and tomato sandwiches, cheese sandwiches, soft drinks, hot dogs, candy, and small cakes.

We extend to each of you an invitation to this big event of our school year. Please come for the whole day and stay for the program in the evening. An all day visitor has more time to look over the numerous exhibits.

PLAN BIG SHOW

The fifth annual Seed, Grain, Potato and Egg Show will be held in the Lincoln High School Auditorium, Thursday, January 12.

Classes open to the public are: 10 ears of Reid's Yellow Dent Corn, 10 ears Golden Queen Corn, 10 ears large White Corn for shelling contest, best peck of wheat, best peck of barley, best peck of oats, best peck of rye.

Best gallon of Orchard Grass seed, best gallon of clover seed, best gallon of Lespedeza seed, best peck of white Irish potatoes, best peck of red Irish potatoes, best dozen white eggs, best dozen brown eggs, best dozen eggs from the certified chicken flocks of the county.

Classes open to the Vocational Agriculture students with all entries to be produced from their project enterprises are: best 10 ears of Reid's Yellow Dent Corn, best 10 ears Golden Queen Corn, best 10 ears large white corn, best peck of wheat, best peck of barley, best peck of white Irish potatoes, best peck of seed Irish potatoes.

Prizes offered in each of the classes are \$2.00 first, \$1.00 second, \$.50 third. An entry fee of 10 cents will be charged for each entry made and each exhibitor will be limited to one prize per class.

An F. F. A. Judging Contest will be held with the boys from the six high schools of Loudoun County and two from Fairfax County participating. In this class a \$5.00 prize is offered to the winning team.

In the afternoon at 2:00 o'clock a public program will be held at which time the prize winners will be announced and prizes will be awarded.

Lunch will be on sale during the noon hour by the Home Ec. girls.

The exhibits must be in place by 10:00 o'clock Thursday morning when the official judging will begin.

Mr. F. S. Grubb of Blacksburg and Mr. D. J. Howard of Winchester will be official judges for the Agriculture Show.
