

Annual Report of the Superintendent of Schools for the Year Closing July 31, 1905.

..... Loudoun County.

The Superintendent will answer briefly the following questions:

1st. Date of Annual Meeting of County or City School Board for reviewing the work of 1904-5.

Ans. August 14th

2nd. Were the accounts of Treasurer laid before the County or City Board at this meeting, and duly examined?

Ans. They had previously been examined by the Div. Supt. aided by the Dist. Clerks and the results were reported to the County Board.
Was their condition satisfactory?

Ans. Yes - entirely so.

3rd. Were the records of the District Boards all laid before the County Board, and duly acted on according to law?

Ans. They were examined by the Div. Supt. and results were reported to the Board.

What was their condition as to accuracy and neatness?

Ans. Owing to changes of Clerks during the year the records in several of the districts were not in a first class condition.

4th. Were the accounts of District Boards compared with those of County Treasurer by the County Board, as required by law?

Ans. Yes - through the Div. Supt. and Dist. Clerks by direction of the Co. Board.

What was the result?

Ans. Satisfactory in all respects.

5th. Was the annual settlement made with the County Treasurer by the County Board, as required by law?

Ans. By order of the Co. Board the settlements were made by the Div. Supt. and Dist. Clerks aided by a Commissioner of Accounts.

Was this settlement satisfactory?

Ans. Yes. The work was done very carefully and the Board was entirely satisfied with the results.

6th. Report any irregularities which may have been discovered in the proceedings of any Board, or in the acts of any official, together with such action as was taken by the County Board in regard thereto.

Ans. Jefferson Dist. Bd. rented a room from one of its Trustees. It was a case of urgent necessity that arose in the middle of the term and no other room could be found. In the same Dist. one of the Trustees took his own team during a time of snow blockade and unloaded a car of coal - no other team could be found for the purpose. In Town of Leesburg, ^{Dist.} one of the Trustees acted as janitor for the white school - efforts to secure an outside party had failed. After a thorough investigation, the Co. Board decided that these irregularities were under the circumstances, unavoidable and justifiable.

7th. Do your District Boards hold regular meetings, and how often?

Ans. No. They meet when called or when business requires attention.

8th. How many schools have been discontinued in consequence of consolidation of schools?

Ans. White, 4; colored, 0; total, 4

9th. Were all your teachers supplied with the Teacher's Register for Virginia Public Schools, and were these Registers all returned at the close of the session to the District Clerks, as required by law?

Ans. All except one - Dist. Clerks report them returned.
