All teachers handling any school funds as a room fund except textbook should show on term report under cash record. Principals should compile under Summary of Local Accounts, D-Other. Test scores are not necessary. Physical inspection should be reported.

Note that monthly attendance reports and lunch claims are to be made for May and June combined. Inventory of food is due at end of year.





To Teachers:

During the week of October 31 two outstanding specialists in the field of youth development will be working in the Loudoun and Fauquier County Schools. The Community Center Educational Project has made it possible for Dr. Robert F. DeHaan and Dr. Jack Kough, Assistant Professors of Human Development at the University of Chicago and community consultants of the Quincy, Illinois, Youth Development Commission, to come to this area. Dr. Kough was a navy officer during the war, and was formerly director of the Community Rehabilitation Project in Salina, Kansas. Later he was a lecturer at the Institute for Educational Leadership in Kyoto, Japan. He was also Assistant Professor of Education at McPherson College, McPherson, Kansas. His specialty is concerned with the emotional adjustment of children.

Dr. DeHaan is formerly a member of the staff of the Human Dynamics Laboratory of the University of Chicago. He was also consultant to the Portland, Oregon, Public Schools' Gifted Child Project and Chairman of the Gifted Child Committee of the Illinois State Association for the education of exceptional children. His specialty is in the field of the education of gifted children.

Both Drs. DeHaan and Kough are now working with the Quincy, Illinois, Youth Development Project, which is a ten year experimental program begun in 1951 to help the community discover children in need of help and to provide ways and means of helping them.

The Youth Development Project grew out of previous research by the University of Chicago in which children were carefully studied during their various periods of growth. Professor ^kobert J. Havighurst, originator of the project, became convinced more help must be given to children in order for them to develop their talents and to reduce unhappiness and delinquency. The Youth Development Project is one of the most outstanding efforts in the country designed to assist children in their growth into happy and constructive adults. During their time with the Youth Development Project, Drs. Kough and DeHaan have developed a <u>Teachers Guidance Handbook</u> designed to help educators in the early recognition of children in need of special assistance and to offer practical suggestions as to what the classroom teacher may do for such children.

Drs. DeHaan and Kough will be working with individual schools during part of the week, but on Saturday will hold a workshop at the Community Center beginning at 10 A. M. This will be a general session which will cover a number of the aspects of the education of both gifted children and children who have maladjustments. It is anticipated that this session will end about 12 noon.

In the afternoon a special group workshop will be held in two sections. One section under Dr. DeHaan will consider specific problems in the area of gifted children; and the group under Dr. Kough will consider the problems faced by the classroom teacher in working with maladjusted children. These small group workshops will begin at 1 o'clock. It is anticipated that they will last about two hours.

Because some of the teachers may wish to stay over for this workshop and bring a lunch rather than eat in one of the restaurants, the Community Center will serve coffee during the noon hour for all teachers who plan to stay over.

The morning meeting is one of the required extra days. The afternoon meeting can be counted as a makeup for one of the special 8 days on duty. Refer to calendar of workshop meetings for 1955-56.

Subjects: Vaccination and soap

Please observe this rule in connection with vaccination:

Pupils under 7 years of age at the opening of school cannot attend school this year unless they were vaccinated before the opening day. I shall consider exceptions upon request of the principal if based on extenuating circumstances, such as persons who recently moved into the County, especially from another state, and persons who can furnish a doctor's statement that the child's parents requested him to vaccinate the child before the polio season and for some reason the doctor thought it should not be done at that time.

Please keep in mind our rule which has provided for a long time that children under 7 at the opening date of school must enter at or near the opening of school. You are to interpret near the opening date of school until and unless a more specific rule is made.

We have \$400 available to assist with the purchase of soap and soap dispensers. You may charge expenditures for these items to us not to exceed an amount equal to \$.08 times your enrolment reported on the first Thursday of school. (Example--Enrolment 180--\$.08 x 180=\$14.40)

- 7. Please distribute school bus schedule forms to drivers whose routes end at your school and have them sent to me as early as possible. We have a number of problems to work out that depend on this information.



- 2. How many readiness tests do you want, if your first grade teacher has not picked them up already?
- 3. Bring in requests for in-service courses which George Washington University offered at our meeting on August 31.
- 4. Bring cumulative records which should go to other schools and pass them along.
- 5. Have you checked with your first grade teachers to see that vaccination rulings are being carried out? Bring in any questions.
- 6. What do you think of this? Mrs. Dolores Phillips will offer free a series of sessions on art scheduled about twice a month to help us with finger painting, ceremics, etc., during the term. The time, place, and more definite plans would be made by the teachers in the group. This would not carry college credit. She will be paid by the Old Dominion Foundation.

State Laws Governing Instructional Phases of Virginia's Public School System are as follows:

Section 22-234. Study of documents of Virginia history and United States Constitution. In preparing the course of study in civics and history in both the elementary and high school grades, the State Board shall give the Declaration of American Independence, the Virginia Statute of Religious Freedom, the Virginia Bill of Rights and section fifty-eight of the Constitution of Virginia, which subjects shall be carefully read and studied, in accordance with the State course of study, which course of study shall require written examinations as to each of the last four mentioned great documents of Virginia's history at the end of the term in which the course is given. An outline shall likewise be given of the Constitution of the United States and the general principles of the Constitution shall be carefully explained. (1928, p. 1217; 1932, p. 536; 1936, p. 510; 1938, p. 375; Hichie Code 1942, Section 688.)

GRADE 8 GEOGRAPHY AND MICTORY FOR LOUDOUN COUNTY

- 1. Loudoun County Government, Geography and History are to be taught the 6th six weeks. Emphasis should be included on the Virginia Constitution in accordance with the above mentioned Section 22-234.
- 2. The entire year will be listed as Grade 8 Geography and History.

GRADE 9 AND 12 CIVICS

Reteach subjects required by Section 22-234 of the Code as wuoted above.
